

### Activity

### Students determine facts and opinions by reading statements on a game board.

- 1. Place game board, number cube, and game pieces on a flat surface.
- 2. Taking turns, students roll the number cube and move game piece the number of spaces shown on the number cube.
- 3. Read statement. For example, Magnets attract objects made of iron.
- 4. State whether the statement is a fact or an opinion (i.e., fact).
- 5. If correct, leave game piece on the space. If incorrect, place game piece back on the previous space.
- 6. Continue until both students reach the end.
- 7. Peer evaluation





### Extensions and Adaptations

- Play game by rolling number cube and stating a fact or opinion (Activity Master C.026.AM2a - C.026.AM2b).
- Circle or highlight facts and opinions in different colors on copies of text.

## **Explanations**

- 1. A **fact** is a statement that can be checked or proved with evidence (proof). To prove that this sentence is a fact, the reader can look in an encyclopedia and see what kinds of instruments are played with mariachi music. The reader could also visit a restaurant or market where live mariachi music is played.
- 2. The other three sentences are factual statements about the movie. They make points that can be proven. "Star Wars: Episode III is not as good as the original films." is not a fact because it cannot be proven to be true and is based on belief.
- 3. "The 1927 Yankees was the greatest baseball team of all time." is not a fact because it cannot be **proven** to be true and is based on belief. This statement is a widely held opinion but is still an opinion.
- 4. An **opinion** is a statement that shows what people believe, feel, or decide about something. Opinions cannot be proven right or wrong. Many people may find the series of books featuring Ramona Quimby funny and relatable, but some people may not. Nothing can prove that the books are funny and relatable.
- 5. A **fact** is a statement that can be checked or proven with evidence (proof). An example of a fact from Passage 1 is "Langford Elementary is a school in Austin, Texas." An example of a fact from Passage 2 is "Jimmy Carter was the 39th president of the United States."
- 6. "X-Men is the most action packed movie of the year" expresses a belief about the movie X-Men and cannot be proven factually true.
- 7. An **opinion** is a statement that shows what people believe, feel, or decide about something. Some people may believe that the cat from the story looked like a mountain lion planning her escape. However, other people may feel differently.

- 8. A **fact** is a statement that can be checked or proven with evidence (proof). If the reader were to meet Roger's dad from the story and visit him at his job, he or she could prove that Roger's dad is a mechanical engineer.
- 9. This states an opinion based on someone's thoughts about the facts. Another person may interpret the facts differently and hold a different opinion.
- 10. That some families may not be able to afford uniforms is a fact that can be backed up with evidence or proof. The other statements, although many people believe them, cannot be proven to be true.
