<p>Reading</p> <p>-Practice writing your name. You can use an attached paper if you'd like. -Read a book with your student. Ask them about the story (What are the characters doing? Was there a problem the characters had to face or solve? How did they solve their problem?)</p>	<p>Reading</p> <p>-Sing the ABC's and practice writing the letters of the alphabet. You can use the attached papers if you'd like. -Practice syllables by clapping the number of syllables in family member's names and animal names. (Panda is 2 syllables, pan-da)</p>	<p>Reading</p> <p>-Practice writing your name. You can use an attached paper if you'd like. -Read a book with your student. It can be the same one from Day 1. Ask your student to draw a picture of their favorite part of the story.</p>	<p>Reading</p> <p>-Sing the ABC's and practice writing the letters of the alphabet. You can use the attached papers if you'd like. -Make a letter web. In the middle of the paper write a letter (example, B) and draw lines coming out from the letter. On the end of each line, draw a picture that starts with the letter B (bug, boy, bat, ball, etc.) You can do this for any letter.</p>	<p>Reading</p> <p>-Practice writing your name. You can use an attached paper if you'd like. -Read a book with your student. It can be the same book from Day 1. Have your student retell the story using a beginning, middle, and ending format. Help them along by looking back at the pictures if needed.</p>

<p>-Use 10 counters and set them out in a row. You can use cheerios, pennies, toy cars, dolls, etc. to count with. Have your child tap each item as they count. This should be 1-to-1 counting (they tap and say the number together.)</p>	<p>-Find things around your house that are a triangle shape. Collect the items in a pile. Put the items in order from biggest to smallest. Sort the items into different piles by their similarities (shape, color, size, etc.).</p>	<p>-Make a number web with the number 5. In the middle of the paper write the number 5 and draw lines coming out from it. On the end of each line, draw a different way to make 5 (counting on fingers, dice, dominos, 10 frame, counting aloud, picture of 5 things, etc.)</p>	<p>-Find things around your house that are a rectangle shape. Collect the items in a pile. Put the items in order from smallest to biggest. Sort the items into different piles by their similarities (shape, color, size, etc.)</p>	<p>-Count to 20 and practice writing your numbers 1-20. You can use the attached paper if you'd like. -Practice counting backwards from 10 to 0.</p>






